About the first edition of the Summer School – activities and results

International Summer School of Latin American Studies, under the slogan *Latin America and the Caribbean, why do we need to know more?* was realized from June 29 to July 3, 2019 in Belgrade (Institute Cervantes, Cultural Center of the municipality of Stari grad "UK Stari grad" and Institute of European Studies) and Novi Sad (University of Novi Sad: Faculty of Philosophy and University Business Academy).

The following data confirms the significance and results of the third edition:

- Number of participants: 18 (15 from Serbia and 3 from abroad: Tunisia, Russia and United Kingdom).
- Number of lecturers: 12 academics and experts from different areas related to Latin America, coming from Serbia, as well as Mexico, Argentina, Brazil, Costa Rica, Spain, Unites States, Germany and Austria.
- An issue of *Reflejo* Magazine, dedicated to the third edition of the International Summer School
 of Latin American Studies, is scheduled for the final quarter of 2019. This bilingual journal
 (Spanish and Serbian) will contain a series of academic and / or critical texts (articles, interviews,
 summaries, translations of relevant texts), signed by both the lecturers and students of the
 School and the organizers, associates and members of the academic board.

How the project is founded and what its achievements and goals are

With its concept and quality that it has achieved over the last three years, Summer School seeks to contribute to empowering young people to try to engage professionally with those regions of the world that we, unfairly, do not pay enough attention to; with whom we traditionally and evidently maintain friendly relations; which bring us many solutions and ideas in the face of the challenges of globalization and modern society of the 21st century. After three successful editions, more than fifty young participants, thirty volunteers, Latin American enthusiasts, and more than thirty exhibitors from Serbia and around the world, the project is recognized as a new energy in the development of Latin American studies in the Balkans, as well as empowering young people to respond to new challenges and temptations that imposes the time in which they live. The operation of the Summer School is based on the work of three committees (academic board, associate committee and organizing committee), who agree that the project aims to:

- Provide support and cooperation between students, academic community, researchers of various profiles, civil society organizations and other stakeholders from different countries on Latin America and the Caribbean topics, as well as to provide incentive for their interconnection and future work.
- Keep up with the aspirations of European countries, primarily with the aspirations of those around Serbia (such as Hungary), which are paying more attention to Latin American studies by investing in the education of their students.

- Contribute to the spread of a very narrow scientific corpus related to Latin America and the Caribbean, and to the creation of the basis for future student projects and the development of Latin American studies in the country and in the region.
- Empower connections between young people from Serbia and the region, and Latin America and the Caribbean.
- Promote interregional and international student, academic, activist and cultural cooperation.
- Be a pivot and a gathering point for Latin Americanists and for those from the country and the region who realize the importance of developing Latin American studies and the need to strengthen the ties with Latin America and the Caribbean.

However, that is not everything! Many point out that it is extremely interesting that the project is led by seven girls (with great and unselfish help from four expert associates), who do not live in the same country and have their meetings and arrangements online. It's a team led by the same vision, kept together with the incredible enthusiasm and faith that they can contribute to the ultimate goal. They do have support from benefactors, friends and associates, like few in this world, who seem to be facing the end of an era.
